## Leading Change. ONE YOUTH AT A TIME...TO 100,000!

In a world of challenges and opportunities, one thing that provides a sense of Hope is connecting to people who have **Empowerment as their Purpose and** Community as their Core Value.

In FY23, we proudly celebrated our Purpose over the past 20 years – creating a reliable, responsive, and real community for young people leaving the foster care system - while also looking to the future and Just in Time's aspirations for our next chapter. We acknowledged our growth - from a small band of volunteers who turned empty spaces into comfortable homes for a few dozen young people exiting foster care - while also considering how that continued growth could reach beyond San Diego to impact young people across the nation.

Our conversations took us down three parallel paths, all leading to significant and lasting change by deepening our services, disrupting ineffective systems, and duplicating our mental model with like-minded partners from coast to coast.

#### Our Big Hairy Audacious Goal? To impact 100,000 young people annually within 10 years.

In San Diego that means an increased commitment to outreach beyond the 3,000+ youth we served in FY23, adding a housing coordinator to focus continuously on finding effective ways to overcome barriers to

stable shelter, greater access to free and reliable mental wellness resources including therapy, lived experienced coaches for our participants, and growing our ecosystem of support in education, employment, transportation, and personal power.

It means turning our attention to support the necessary advocacy to encourage policymakers and service providers to rethink existing child welfare and juvenile justice policies and practices with input from those with lived expertise in the foster care system. In FY23, our support for Foster Alumni & Youth Community Empowerment Solutions (FAYCES) saw extraordinary change from this process, and we plan to have even greater impact in the year to come.

Finally, we began our "scaling by sharing" strategy with impact-driven organizations from Utah to Massachusetts coming together on our journey to a 100K community.

And we published a book.

Our FY23 Annual Gratitude Report offers more detail, stories, inspiration, and information about the people who made it all possible to always move forward with confidence and courage.

Leading Change. And more determined than ever to change the world...one youth at a time.







## L'eading Change Milestones DEEPENING SERVICES



#### Shark Tank Elevation

The annual Shark Tank competition has always been a major highlight at

JIT's Pathways to Financial Power Conference. Each year, three finalists pitch their best new business ideas to a group of judges with the chance to win cash prizes, up to \$3,000 to help them make their dream a reality. In September 2022, support for those dreams went to a whole new level when San Diego entrepreneur Mike Lamb recruited a group of local "sharks" to increase the prize amount to \$20,000 and provide weeks of invaluable coaching for the winner, Stephany Polanco, founder of Ethereal Picnics!



#### Coach **Approach Expansion**

For 10 years, the JIT community grew strong and more effective by using the

Coach Approach to Mentoring as a powerful tool to train volunteers to see participants as creative, resourceful and whole, to set aside their agenda to practice active listening and understanding, and finally to have empowerment as their intention rather than "fixing" a problem. In the Fall of FY23, JIT made the decision to expand the benefits of the Coach Approach principles and practices beyond mentoring and laid the groundwork for Coach Approach to Relationships, Coach Approach to Healing and Coach Approach to Networking.



#### Financial **Equity** Learning Arc

Back in July 2021, the Annie E **Casey Foundation** reached out to

JIT to ask if we were interested in a learning agenda to explore ways for embedding racial and ethnic equity in financial capability strategies for young people who are involved in foster care. That began a twoyear exploration of ways to test the impact of sharing knowledge of historical and persistent racial wealth equity barriers with Financial Fitness 102 participants. The before and after knowledge results were impressive. For example, before, only 32% of participants said, "I am empowered to create positive financial outcomes for myself." After, the number was 95%.



#### Game Changing Grant

As FY23 drew to a close, JIT was selected as one of only 21

grant recipients from more than 150 organizations that submitted letters of Interest to the SDG&E Community Assistance Fund to bolster housing stability and food security for vulnerable populations. Funds from the \$250,000 grant will be used to reduce and prevent housing insecurity for youth in our community through increased outreach, greater rent assistance, and a dedicated JIT Housing Coordinator to provide more individualized attention to navigate San Diego's housing crisis. SDG&E's generous investment can have a transformative impact for the youth we serve.

## Mental Wellness Access

#### LEADING CHANGE SERVICES SPOTLIGHT

COVID-19 disruptions significantly increased awareness of the crucial need for access to therapeutic resources for those experiencing overwhelming stress or persistent mental health challenges. For those who experienced foster care, a history of inconsistent access to counseling due to red tape, financial barriers and a lack of trust based on harmful court mandated therapy while in care complicated matters even more.

With our understanding of the urgent need to fill this gap as a fundamental basic need, JIT committed to significantly increasing mental wellness resources for youth impacted by foster care. Clinical psychologist Dr. Jill Ault was hired to engage in and lead a collaborative process with Dr. Richard Levak, Dr. Milton Z. Brown and Alliant International University graduate students to create an innovative, free, reliable therapeutic resource for our participants, alumni and staff.

Once we made it available, the numbers showed how JIT participants are clearly choosing to use JIT for this resource, a testament to the trust we've established within this community.

To accommodate this growth and ensure future access, JIT also expanded our office space at our Mission Valley location to include a Mental Wellness Center. This will allow us to serve more youth with individual sessions and also accommodate group and couples' sessions to improve people's most significant relationships.

## L'eading Change Milestones DISRUPTION/ADVOCACY



#### Sharing Lived Experience

JIT found the perfect way to show a real commitment to

increasing access to Lived Experience Coaching (LEC) as the new year began. Her name is Samantha Harmer and this year she went from longtime Coach Approach participant to a JIT leader as our first full-time Lived Experience Coach Coordinator, responsible for recruiting, training, and connecting LEC's to Coaching opportunities, internally and externally.



#### **Juvenile Justice Books**

San Diego District Attorney Summer Stephan committed to

sharing Life Changing Choices with her legal network and included co-author Caitlin Radigan to share information about JIT services as a panelist at Las Colinas Women's Detention Facility. She delivered 250 JIT books for youth in Juvenile Hall and spoke with youth while touring the facilities. Judges Tilisha Martin, Ana España, Charles Bell, and Marian Gaston also connected with JIT in significant ways.



The Book Launch

Perhaps the biggest advocacy milestone of the year was

the publication and launch of Just in Time's Life Changing Choices: The 7 Essential Choices at the Heart of Transformational Change For Foster Youth and your Community (more on page 10). JIT invited supporters, policy makers, participants, and alumni to our first ever change-making luncheon event focused on sharing a new mental model as an alternative to traditional child welfare systems. At the center of the event was a panel discussion by our five lived expertise staff members who contributed to the content of the book.



Mastering Social Work

JIT hosted Dr. Stacy Dunkerley,

Assistant Professor SDSU School of Social Work, and the SDSU Master of Social Work 2023 graduating cohort to create awareness and possible alignment with JIT's mental model, increase knowledge of JIT services, and share the impact of Foster Alumni and Youth Community Empowerment Solutions (FAYCES). The day included a lived expert panel, a copy of Life Changing Choices and powerful breakout conversations.

### FAYCES Foster Alumni & Youth Community Empowerment Solutions LEADING CHANGE ADVOCACY/DISRUPTION SPOTLIGHT

JIT has already demonstrated a strong commitment to leveraging significant resources to advance reforms in Child Welfare Services by supporting JIT staff member Simone Hidds-Monroe as a valued member of the County of San Diego's Child and Family Strengthening Advisory Board.

With the controversies around the fate of San Pasqual Academy (SPA), Simone's perspective became even more influential because of her status as an alum of SPA. The discussions led to the Board of Supervisors asking Simone to lead the creation of a new body to mobilize and express the insights and opinions of those impacted by the foster care system. The Foster Alumni and Youth Community Empowerment Subcommittee (FAYCES) was formed, the first such effort to formalize inclusion of foster youth as an ongoing part of the decision-making process for child welfare philosophy, policies, and procedures.

FAYCES goal is to ensure that all decisions affecting current and former foster youth impacted by Child Welfare Services and Probation are grounded in full information, true compassion, and clear accountability to act in the best interest of current and former system-impacted youth. For this to happen effectively and meaningfully, FAYCES has dedicated its efforts to ensure that any critical conversations and decisions related to the foster youth experience include current and former foster youth as full partners and decision makers. It is the first San Diego County recognized organization dedicated to the lived expertise of current and former foster youth influencing the policies, practices, and approaches of the County's Child Welfare Services, Juvenile Justice, and Probation.

For example, FAYCES submitted a proposal for recommendations and implementation for allocation of a \$5M grant for county funds allocated to Career Pathways for Foster Youth. 80% of the proposal recommendations were incorporated into the final plans for funding.

To sustain its efforts for the long term, FAYCES plans to change its status from a Board of Supervisors Subcommittee to Foster Alumni and Youth Community Empowerment Solutions.



## L'eading Change Milestones SCALING



#### **Scaling Vision**

After adopting a 10-Year Big Hairy Audacious Goal (BHAG) of reaching 100,000 young people impacted by foster care nationwide annually, three

"scaling by sharing" options were chosen: Thought Leader/Field Builder, where JIT influences the actions of others through research, presentations, and publications; Capacity Builder, where JIT coaches/ consults with other organizations to successfully adopt the JIT model; and Direct Implementor, where JIT scales work by using designated JIT staff trained to launch specific services.



#### Angels Landing Visit

More than a year after

Seint Beauty came to San Diego for their Annual Conference and fell in love with JIT's model, two things happened. First, they let us know they were hoping to support a JIT-like organization when they returned to St. George, Utah. Second, when they couldn't find one, they decided to start their own life-changing community! Newly hired Executive Director Nate Marsh paid us a visit and we forged an agreement that made Angels Landing JIT's first 100K scaling partner. And they already have plans to expand across the state!



#### **Bridgesplanning**

The Bridgespan Group is known worldwide for collaborating with social change leaders, nonprofits, and social entrepreneurs seeking solutions to some of the toughest issues communities face. In the process, they improve the capacity of organizations to scale their impact and effectiveness. That's why JIT reached out to convince them they couldn't find a better prospect/partner than JIT. Our gamechanging collaboration is already shaping Just in Time 3.0! Stay tuned.

Unfortunately, hundreds of thousands of children in the United States are being failed because of a child welfare system that was based on a mental model established a century and a half ago. Then, suffering from disconnection and a lack of foundational life skills and resources, these children exit the foster care system with dire consequences for themselves and the larger community.

Life Changing Choices: The 7 Essential Choices at the Heart of Transformational Change for Foster Youth and Your Community was written by Just in Time for Foster Youth staff members, most with lived experience and lived expertise in foster care, to begin a conversation about a new idea with the potential to break the cycle of foster care in America.

Life Changing Choices challenges the prevailing mindset of the existing child welfare/foster care system that broken children come from broken homes and need to be "fixed". The alternative vision put forth in this book is based on demonstrated and measurable impact over 20 years in the Just in Time for Foster Youth Community. The foundation of the proposed shift is based on seven essential decisions that lead to Empowerment.

Connection and Community as demonstrated by JIT's 20 years of experience to achieve lasting positive impact.



Choice 2: Who are You Serving? (See Damaged & Broken or Creative, Resourceful & Whole)

Choice 3: What will You Promise? (Build a System or a Community)

Choice 4: Where will You Find Answers? (Act from YOUR Agenda or Listen to Lived Experience Experts)

Choice 5: When will You Know You're Succeeding? (Report What was Done or Share What had Lasting Impact)

Choice 6: How will You Sustain Your Efforts? (Follow the Funding or Engage with Impact)


Choice 7: Who can Start THIS Where You Live? (Wait for Someone Else or Be the Needed Change)

In fact, our Lasting Impact Fulfillment Tracking research confirmed that durable change is driven by key factors that help resilient young people become more Confident, Capable, and Connected, predicting their lasting success:

- Filling gaps in knowledge and experience for greater capacity to meet the challenges they face
- Helping youth identify self-limiting beliefs and personal strengths
- Encouraging each participant to take ownership of their unique story and authentic voice
- Creating connections to trusted relationships with supportive adults and like-minded peers

Using this as a firm foundation, we have created a comprehensive variety of innovative, individualized, and volunteer-driven services that increase the chances of self-sufficiency with life-affirming relationships at the heart of all the work we do.

## The 4 Cz Measurable Qualitative Intended Impact

JIT tracks key drivers of change that become catalysts for personal growth in the young people we serve. Each service and resource we offer is designed to help them on the path to becoming more Confident (internal power), Capable (competence toward mastery), Connected (relational support), and Conscious (self-awareness). We measure impact by aligning survey questions with these "4 C's".

I consciously think about what I need vs. what I want before spending my money.

**Before: 26% After: 95%** 

#### **Rise to Resilience**

"Intervention that is not rooted in community is not effective. Disconnection is at the root of many issues facing foster youth. We can provide all the resources we want to an individual, but if they are going back into society disconnected, did we really service that person?

It's important to provide vital historical, political, and economic context to the challenges youth currently face. In my work contracting with non-profits locally, nationally, and even in the Dominican Republic and Indonesia, we have been successful in shifting both the conversation and culture toward community care, creating space for individuals to recognize the challenges they face are not theirs alone, but are shared by many others in their communities."

In 2022, when Kory left Pittsburgh for San Diego, he was leaving behind more than his hometown; he was leaving behind a dark period of uncertainty and betting on a better life.

Having survived foster care, Kory found himself overwhelmed by anxiety and stress and consequently had dropped out of college. "When I moved to San Diego, I just wanted to improve myself," he said.

Kory's girlfriend, also a former foster youth, suggested he join her for a JIT Rise to Resilience workshop. It was here that Kory connected to a pathway through the emotional pain he had been experiencing. He leaned deeper into mind/body connection and began to embrace healthy practices, such as getting a full eight hours of sleep to help him regulate his mood.

Kory also began working with JIT wellness interns. As he tells us, "When I was little, I had severe anger issues. When I'd be sent away from a foster home, they'd tell me, 'You aren't a bad kid, but the things you do aren't good,' and I interpreted that to mean that anger is bad. My repressed anger evolved into

depression." Now Kory is learning to express his anger in a healthy way.

In addition to R2R and JIT Therapy, Kory has been benefiting from more JIT services, including College Bound, and has now re-enrolled in college!

"Becoming Foster Youth Liaison for San Diego Workforce Partnership feels like coming full circle. I exited foster care through a guardianship on my 16th birthday that disqualified me from a lot of resources, like transitional housing and help with college. Now, I've had the opportunity to provide support for the same JIT services that filled the gap in care for me when I left the system.

SDWP supports youth with educational and professional development, but we need to look at this issue in an expansive way because youth can't focus on the support provided if they're overwhelmed with the challenge of surviving – feeding themselves, maintaining housing, finding transportation. With help to move from survival mode they can expand their education, invest in professional development, and achieve a better tomorrow."

## Leveraging Strengths for Professional Success

Michael loves people and networking, so when Pathways to Financial Power appeared on his radar, he was excited to join.

"I'm a business and accounting major, so I know the math side, but Pathways seemed like a chance to get into the Business World, network, and build my professional wardrobe. To be honest, I don't have a lot of clothing that is appropriate for business. I wasn't raised around that."

As a Native American, Michael spent his childhood living on a reservation before being placed with his sister in Stockton. "I wasn't in a business environment and there were few business role models, you know?"

Michael was paired with a Pathways coach in his field of interest. He also began attending Pathways workshops. "It was so in-depth, almost like a college class. They focused a lot on personal development and bettering yourself, which I feel is even more important."

Michael is learning how to leverage his strengths in his professional work. He learned that he is disciplined and good at structuring daily tasks and routines. He found it fun and inspiring to set goals that were SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-Bound).

Over the summer, Michael landed his first professional internship at a wealth management firm in La Jolla. As Michael tells us, "Not only am I dressed for success, I'm using the skills gained at Pathways to Financial Power to be successful at a job that I love."

"I had a relatively positive and stable experience in foster care, which led me to question why so many of my peers have not. What needs to change to ensure that every child impacted by foster care has that same opportunity to experience stability, achieve success, and continue doing well?

Having seen the consequences of The System I ask, "What can be done better to support our youth?" We can commit to intended impacts for every resource and service provided to system impacted youth. We have the opportunity to extend beyond satisfaction that "at least we are providing something" to truly committing to proving and Improving services and resources, grounded in intention. Collaboration and co-design with current and former foster youth and justice involved youth is critical to this approach."

## ... Serving Life Changing Relationships...

Janae was 8 when her mom passed away and she discovered art as a way to grieve and heal.

"I drew my feelings. I have always turned to art to express my emotions, whether that's through colors, poetry, writing or music, but mostly, I drew a lot."

With art as a touchstone, Janae persevered through a dysfunctional guardianship and started college at San Diego State University where she worked toward her bachelor's degree in psychology with a minor in art. She also found Just in Time.

Through JIT's mental wellness service, Janae was invited to participate in an art workshop facilitated by volunteers from the San Diego Water Color Society (SDWS) to paint abstract animals. Drawing inspiration from her dreams, Janae skillfully coaxed a vivid blue elephant from the canvas. Later, her piece would hang in a dedicated art show for JIT participants at the SDWS Gallery.

"When I was a little girl, I used to write down things I wanted to do. One was to have my art hang in an art gallery."

Janae's piece sold the day of the art opening.

"Seeing my art hung on the wall felt like a dream come true. It felt like all my hard work had paid off. I felt worthy and like I could do anything I put my mind to."

Since the art show, Janae has become even more connected to SDWS where she continues to take workshops and was gifted an extended membership that will enable her to show her work at future shows.

"I heard about the JIT community from the radio, not from a social worker or probation officer. I never knew I could identify as a foster youth and receive money to go to college or other resources. I thought I was just a criminal in Juvenile Hall.

No one's telling youth in the Juvenile Justice system that there are resources and community available. They're treated as criminals being prepped for the adult system.

I'm passionate that wards of the court and juvenile justice impacted youth are empowered and knowledgeable of their rights and resources. I also believe if we're truly going to break the cycle of foster care, we must help youth learn how to be the best parents they can be by demonstrating healthy family dynamics and introducing them to a community."

## 

Signing the lease on his first apartment, Yugene had mixed emotions.

He was happy to be moving in and excited by the idea of having his own home, but there was anxiety as well. One of the closet doors hung from a single hinge, cabinets were damaged, and property management was slow to respond. He ended up doing most of the repairs himself.

"I've really been on my own trying to figure this life stuff out. If I had family to help out, I believe I would've made more progress."

At Walmart, Yugene found a futon for his living room, but the space was still pretty bare. After a month in the apartment, his caseworker referred him Just in Time, where he quickly signed up for My First Home.

"I have a 3-year-old daughter, so I wanted to make sure everything was safe. My second focus was the kitchen and living room, which I wanted to be a comfortable place where people could hang out and relax."

At the Just in Time monthly "Shopping Day," Yugene was paired with a group of volunteers who were all committed to helping him realize his vision. Perusing

the aisles, Yugene took turns testing different couches for comfort. He found a coffee table almost identical to one he'd been looking at on Craigslist. Kitchen utensils, cleaning supplies, and a bed were all strategically placed into the JIT moving truck and delivered to Yugene's house.

"I got everything I needed for my apartment, even stuff I didn't think I needed, including a 75-inch TV!"

Now, thanks to My First Home, Yugene has a safe and comfortable place to call his own!

"In collaborating with other organizations, we see they can easily describe the services provided and number of young people engaged in opportunities, and even outcomes achieved. However, once young people exit the service window, that information drops off. There's not enough tracked information to say how these resources really impacted young people's lives. At Just in Time, we focus on Lasting Impact – How are our participants navigating the world years from now?

If we want equitable change in the lives of young people impacted by child welfare systems, we must know how they've shifted their mentality, their emotions, and their behaviors well after they've received services. This requires organizations to lead with inquiry, to have honest conversations, and to be inclusive when addressing the needs of the communities they serve."

## "License to Succeed:

In San Diego, getting from home to school and work is a major challenge if you don't have a car.

For Joanna, this meant a 45-minute walk from the trolley stop to work – one way!

"I took the bus and trolley everywhere," she remembered. "Traveling from my house in South Bay to school at SDSU took two hours. I had to carry pounds of groceries in my hand to the trolley and then to the bus stop, and then to my apartment. Groceries were so hard."

When Joanna found a car for \$900, she was determined to get her license. She got as far as her permit test, and then hit a wall. A written test was one thing, but actually getting behind the wheel of a car? Joanna needed someone to teach her how to drive.

"As a former foster youth, I knew there had to be something. I researched my butt off and then I found Just in Time."

Joanna signed up for Changing Lanes where she was given access to more than 6 hours of behind-the-wheel training for free!

As Joanna cruised city streets, congested parking lots, and freeways, her driving confidence grew. She passed her behind-the-wheel test with flying colors. Now, she drives to work, school, and the Just in Time headquarters where she participates in College Bound workshops!

"When a young person exits the foster care system, they're trying to figure out how to live on their own; how to get their basic needs met, and they might not know what they want to do with their life. When they have a bad term at college or fumble in some way, that shouldn't put them at jeopardy of losing their financial aid or their housing.

What I want to know is: How can we give youth more chances? How can we make sure we're not piling on requirements that counteract what we want them to achieve in their lives? We have to give young people, especially those who have faced adversity, the opportunity to fail while letting them know that we are still here for them."

## From Surviving to Thriving "

When Jasmine entered the foster care system at 17, there were no plans for placement with a family. She was transferred to a group home in Orange County to bide her time and age out.

"When I turned 18, I was given an address and told that I was free to go. I wasn't prepared for where I was going to be or for the reality of being an adult. It was chaotic. There were a lot of bumps in the road."

Jasmine joined Just in Time when she needed help furnishing her apartment. She quickly began utilizing other services like Financial Fitness and College Bound. She finally had resources and guidance to help her create an adult life.

Then, life happened. Jasmine's car broke down, creating unexpected expenses in her budget. She called Just in Time and explained she had a three-day grace period to make her rent payment. Thankfully, she found an ally on the other end of the line. She was able to get the money for rent and pay on time.

"I know I can count on JIT to act quickly when times get tough. Honestly, Just in Time is my lifeline." Jasmine continues to charge toward her goals.

She recently completed an internship at Foster
Club and is excited to return to classes at San
Diego City College where she's pursuing a degree
in social work.



"The impact of emotions and learned behavior is missing from a lot of traditional financial literacy courses provided to foster youth. Traditional courses focus on the numbers in the spreadsheet, the dollars and cents. This approach implies that it's just math and if you can get the numbers right, you'll be able to execute good money habits and achieve your goals.

In reality, our relationship to money is often rooted in emotion. It's important to examine feelings related to how adults in our lives handled money, emotions around scarcity and the tendency to base self-worth on the ability to buy material items. Helping foster youth navigate this emotional landscape is crucial to healing from self-doubt, shame and guilt to create a foundation of financial stability, empowering them to achieve their goals."

## 

When Monique joined Financial Fitness, she knew her relationship with money "wasn't great." Her bank account reflected this - bouncing up and down with her mood swings.

"If I had a lump sum of cash in my account, I wouldn't want to touch it. I wasn't saving or investing; it just sat there. And then I'd get into random moods where I'd spend a lot of money in a short period of time."

Monique enrolled in Financial Fitness 101, where she was paired with Coach Carol. They met regularly to go over coursework and talk about financial goals. Carol provided accountability, but also foresight - If this is what you spend in a month, what does that look like in a year?

Monique was challenged to reflect, not just on her financial future, but on her past. And the more she looked, the more she recognized her parents' spending habits in her own behavior.

"We were chronically homeless. They would spend money on hotels so we'd have somewhere to stay. If they did have money, they would spend it on materialistic things. Now, just being aware of those patterns is helping me make healthier choices." Now enrolled in Financial Fitness 103, Carol is learning about investments. In fact, with guidance from her coach, she recently opened her first 401K.

As Monique shares, "A lot of us former foster youth don't have anyone to guide us, and that's what Just in Time provides. They give us guidance, and they help restore the hope that we are somebody and that we can amount to what other people amount to despite what we've gone through."

"When we provide youth with the space and opportunity to make their own choices, we empower them and elevate their sense of self-worth. Rather than tell them what decisions they need to make, we engage in reflection on their individual needs to create a partnership based on trust and collaboration towards their wellness journey.

Just in Time doesn't have a one-size-fits-all model, and we don't have procedures to minimize or categorize the youth we serve. Most importantly, we don't ask them to prove that they need assistance. All our processes are designed to help youth learn through their experiences so they can make their own autonomous choices. We want to partner with youth, not make choices for them based on what boxes they're able to check."

## 

Entering foster care at the age of twelve, Ana experienced seven different placements in three years

"I always remember sitting in foster homes thinking, 'When I get out of here and have control over my life, I want to do something with myself.' I knew the key was going to college."

With an associate's degree in her sights, Ana enrolled at Mira Costa College but, without a laptop, she struggled to access coursework online. When a counselor referred her to College Bound at Just in Time, she rushed to apply.

"I received a laptop, a printer, and a coach who took me on a "shopping spree" for school supplies. It seemed like a miracle!"

At the College Bound event, Ana met other participants, many of them working toward their bachelor's degrees and a few who were shooting for their master's.

"I remember seeing them and thinking that would be so amazing. But I still didn't see myself doing it. I thought I would barely get my bachelor's. I had a lot of doubt." With consistent support from the College Bound community, Ana achieved her bachelor's degree in Social Work from San Diego State University last June. She also received a Master Your Dream scholarship, which is enabling her to go to graduate school.

"I feel like every time something comes up, every time I need help, JIT is there for me. Being connected to people who are similar to me has been such a game-changer on my journey. The JIT community has been the support I've never had."





## Volunteering as a Vocation

When Mary Gross was first paired with Cecy at Just in Time, she wondered if they would hit it off.

"In the beginning, I didn't think we had a lot in common, we were so different," remembers Cecy.

But Youth Services, which strives to be intentional in its pairing of coaches and youth, got it right. Despite not sharing career aspirations or other life experiences, the two always had something to talk about. As they met regularly for walks and lunches, their relationship slowly began to evolve and deepen.

"She was so easy to talk to," said Cecy. "She made me so comfortable, and she had so many resources. Somehow, she became a part of my everyday life."

"At one point, she began calling me her 'diary' because she was able to tell me things that she couldn't tell anyone else," remembers Mary. "I allowed her to talk about things without judging her."

And, in January 2023, after 9 years of being connected through Just in Time, Mary formally adopted Cecy at the San Diego Courthouse.

"Cecy often talks about the fact that I never gave up on her when other people in her life almost always did. Cecy is thriving now, knowing she has someone who puts her first." - Mary



"In the foster care system, I had no parent figures and around in foster homes where every new parent was supposed to be my mom or dad but never was. It's surreal. I'm 27, and I have a mom!" - Cecy





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
